Pittsburgh Filmmakers began as a filmmaking-equipment access cooperative in 1971 and is now one of the oldest and largest media arts centers in the US. Hundreds of local artists get full access to our facility, comprised of 40,000 square feet of editing suites, darkrooms, soundstage, as well as, a vast equipment cache. Pittsburgh Filmmakers is also an accredited school, offering college-level classes year round. The exhibition program operates three theaters including the only movie theater in downtown Pittsburgh, and presents the area's largest annual film event - the Three Rivers Film Festival. In 2006, we merged with Pittsburgh Center for the Arts.

Pittsburgh Center for the Arts (est. 1945) is a nonprofit organization that fosters a vibrant contemporary arts scene in southwestern Pennsylvania by promoting creativity and accessibility to all forms of visual art. In addition to its studio arts programming, PCA exhibits work by contemporary regional artists; supports, promotes and sells their work to the public and offers a variety of arts education programs to schools and community organizations.
